PSC Favorite Ski Stories & Pics THE HISTORY OF NASTAR Faster! Faster! Until the Thrill of Speed Overcomes the Fear of Death

When was the last time you entered a ski race? A long time ago when most of PSC were just beginners and intermediate skiers, the **NASTAR** race was a highlight of our ski weekend. It was a lot of fun to challenge each other and cheer for everyone as they charge down the hill. It is

actually a really good way to measure and improve your skiing skills as well. We felt like we were going like a bat out of hell and then we saw the video.

In 1968, NASTAR was developed by SKI Magazine editor John Fry because he was also the editor of GOLF magazine and he wanted to create a handicap system similar to Golf. Racers



are scored by earning a handicap that represents their ability. The handicap provides participants with a tangible number, or handicap, that is the percentage they are behind the time of the National Standard or the National Pacesetter. The U.S. Ski Team's fastest racers set the Par Time for NASTAR. The Par Time or National Standard is the Zero Handicap that all participants compete against. If you get a 30 hcp then you are 30% slower than Mickaela Shiffrin or Lindsey Vonn.

The medals are awarded based on your handicap, age, and gender. Many of the guys racing when I started were in their 30s or 40s. I would beat their time, but they would get a better medal. Thus, the term **OLD GOLD** was created by PSC.

NASTAR stands for **NA**tional **STA**ndard **R**ace and is the largest public grassroots ski racing program in the world, and now boasts more than 100,000 races at over 100 resorts around the country. Today, NASTAR is owned and operated by Outside Inc. The program went through several national sponsors, the latest being a few Beer companies and <u>Nature Valley</u>.

NASTAR has been thru ALOT of changes over the years. They added Platinum to the Gold, Silver, and Bronze medals. They also sliced the age groups so thin that you can't calculate your handicap on your push button calculator watch like I did. There must be an APP for that now. Ski Racing was the end of skiing for a few Piccadillians. Brian, Roy, and Manette had spectacular crashes, but most of us thrived and enjoyed the thrill.

Trip Updates -

Trips, Trips, Trips!

This is not going to be the usual article about how great our trips – you already know that they are! However, we feel that you need to know what is going on behind the scenes. By now you should be aware that the weekend Brule trip has been changed to a drive-up from a bus trip. We are aware



that people enjoy the camaraderie on the bus, and the fact that you don't need to drive yourself— especially when drinks are served on the bus— but the cost of the bus has gotten way out of hand. The bus companies raised the prices when the gas prices were high, and they have not lowered their prices now that gas costs have come down. Other things also factor into the



bus cost – the bus driver pay and insurance (paid by the bus company) – I'm sure that there other costs factored in as well. The bus cost is a fixed cost, if there is 1 person on the bus or 46. The point is – we really need to fill a bus (30 or more people) in order to make it even **somewhat** affordable on a per person basis, and we simply didn't have anywhere near the number of people

to cover the cost of the bus. <u>We also need more people on the Mystery Trip for the same</u> reason.

Now let's talk about the Out West trips – last year we filled all of our trips pretty easily, this year we are having a lot of trouble filling Panorama and Snowbird. When we plan the trips for the

upcoming season, the trip committee and the Board go by past experience, Trip Survey results, and what bids we receive, then we make our best guess as to what will sell. When we announced the trip slate, everyone said how great it was, but then the signups didn't reflect that. We are managing to make Panorama go, but we <u>really need 2 more people</u> on Snowbird, or the club will face a significant financial penalty.

In addition, lift prices are going up with no end in sight. For examples : Lift tickets at Cascade Mountain are \$95 on weekends and \$84 Monday thru Thursday and for some Out West prices, see black box.



We have been sending out surveys, but we need direct feedback now, in order to determine how we should plan next season – and that planning is already in progress.

So we are asking for your honest input, please think about the following questions and send your feedback to both Jackie & Julian at : <u>jackied718@comcast.net</u> and <u>julianf@att.net</u>

- 1. Are you doing fewer ski trips now than in the previous few seasons?
- 2. Are the non-ski trips factoring into your answer to the previous question?
- 3. Should we continue to offer 2 non-ski trips or just the Winter Warmup in December?
- 4. Should we offer more than 2 non-ski trips?
- 5. Should we continue to offer one 4-5 day ski trip?
- 6. Should we continue to offer 3 week-long ski trips this includes Chicago Week?
- 7. Should we drop the bus on the weekend Midwest trip (knowing that we need 30+ signups)?
- 8. Should we just go with drive-up Midwest trips, possibly including mid-week trips?

Thank you for your time in reading this, and in giving us honest feedback.


First Winter Pop Up Hike, Little Red School House, Thurs., 1/11, 10:30am

Starved Rock Hike/Eagle Watch Weekend/Lunch, Sat., 1/27, 10am Sharp

Join us for a 3-mile Winter hike through the St Peter Sandstone Formation and waterfalls of Starved Rock State Park. Our naturalist guide will lead the hike and share information about the area, history, the canyons, river and more. Depending on the conditions, we could see the

beauty of the frozen waterfalls and ice over the river. Eagles are known to congregate at Plum Island along the Illinois River's open pockets of waters near the Starved Rock Lock and Dam, below Lovers Leap and Eagle Cliff Overlook. How great would it be if we observed an eagle swooping toward the water and clutching a fish! Bring your binoculars just in case.

We'll meet in the Main Lodge at 9:45am. The hike begins at 10 am sharp and should finish up around 1pm, at which time we will break for lunch and a brew. The hike fee is \$20 for the guide and includes: Starved Rock swag, some treats, and a coupon for coffee or hot cocoa from the café. Those interested



can enjoy lunch and brew after the hike, whether it be in the Backdoor Lounge or the Lodge restaurant. We have reservations for 20, so come on out and enjoy the hike, or just the lunch.



Another fantastic option during this special weekend is the Eagle Watch event, "Birds of Prey" show. They will have wild birds of prey (45-minute show). Scheduled in the Great Hall West, adjacent to the lounge and restaurant. The live shows are scheduled at 10am, 1pm (during lunch) and 3pm. Make sure you are prepared for the hike and dress accordingly, good hiking shoes and layers.

Punta Cana Side Trip Recap from Terry T: Eight of us took the Bávaro Runners' cultural tour to the countryside of Dominican Republic. Passing through small towns in an open air bus, our



guide Angel talked about the history of Hispañola (named by Christopher Columbus). Occupations and wars between Spain and France saw a s lave rebellion in 1804 succeed and rename the island Haiti, the indigenous Taino name (Wikipedia). In 1844 a Spanish priest led army kicked the French Haitians out of the east and led to Dominican independence.



Main products then as now are tobacco, rum, coffee, chocolate; also coconut oil, bananas, and cattle. We learned the median Dominican wage is \$200 a month. Apartments in the Punta Cana resort area cost \$600 a month. Many resort workers live in Higuey, population 400,000



where apartments rent for \$400 a month. Our guide pointed out one large apartment complex built for workers' affordability. The workers reportedly receive good benefits such as health care, and have good working conditions. Resort shifts often consist of 5 hours on several hours off midday and then 5 hours on.



The Bavaro Runners, typical of the island's tourism industry, donate time and money (10% of costs) to build and maintain schools, provide uniforms, toys at Christmas. The resort sector had passed an

ordinance limiting the height of buildings to 4 floors. Our hotel was two stories, keeping a low, subtle profile. Large developers lobbied for and got it overturned to build up to 22 floors in the Punta Cana/Bávaro area!

In 2023, a record 10 million tourists visited. That's roughly one tourist for every DR resident! Regardless of the push/pull of competing interests, I sensed optimism, pride, hope, and rising standards of living in those whom we met on our tours and at the resort. – *Terry*
